# **Urban Geography**

The study of areas which have a high concentration of buildings and infrastructure: cities. These are areas with high population densities.

#### Some words to know...

Urbanization: the way a population shifts from rural to urban areas, and the ways society adapts to that change.

Infrastructure: the basic organizational structures a society uses to function (ex: roads, bridges, power grids).

'Developed' countries have better infrastructure

#### Growth of Urban Areas

America was founded on the small town / village concept.

Some small towns grew FAST and eventually became cities.

The urban core serves as the downtown or central business district of a city.

#### Growth of Cities!

80% of Americans live in an urban area today.

In 1950 only 64% of people lived in urban areas.

In 1850, only 30%

Suburbs : a developed area at the edge of a city that is mainly homes.




